To inquire how much of it is due to political ambition, how much to personal jealousy, how much to the presence or the absence of this or that quality of head or heart, how much to the want of public experience, if not ungracious is at least unnecessary. It is no time now for such discussions. This one thing is sufficient: <i>Secretary Stanton has utterly lost the confidence of the people.</i> For that reason alone, if there were no other, it would be useless to keep him in his place. The President has called for three hundred thousand more men. It is our religious belief that that call will never be answered, unless the War Department is committed to different hands. A large area of territory has been won by our brave soldiers; the Mississippi is again free, and under the protection of our flag, driven back and beaten in the West, the enemy to our constitution and government has gathered his forces at the rebel capital, in large numbers, and there makes a desperate stand; foreign interference is threatened by the public journals of two mighty European empires.
